Environmental Sustainability needs to be our focus as we move toward taking ownership of our own building. We have the opportunity to reduce our congregation's environmental footprint while lightening the burden of our lifestyle on our Earth's systems.

- Participate in the "Greening" of the Tapestry building at Birtcher including the purchase of appliances, materials used for remodeling rooms, cleaning supplies, lighting, etc.
- Work with the landscapers as appropriate to promote "green gardening and landscaping" by incorporating native and drought-tolerant plantings in conformance with water conservation goals and include a butterfly garden and possible use of rain barrels.
- Investigate developing a kid friendly area in the surrounding landscape and possible seating for coffee hour.
- Work with the Building Committee to include a "Green Clause" in the rental contract developed for the Birtcher property.
- Advocate for use of a janitorial service who will utilize Certified Green Seal cleaning products and do a price analysis of using recycled and/or environmentally friendly trash bags and paper products.
- Explore the idea of creating a Green Campaign Fund, to be spent only on projects that reduce the carbon footprint of the organization.
- Locate a space for bike racks and make a proposal to institute them to promote biking as an alternative to using fossil fuel transportation.
- Gather information and perform a feasibility study on installing solar panels at the new location and promote a fund raiser to help alleviate the cost.
- Provide educational films and discussion on environmentally conscious subjects.
- Set up a meet and greet program for Citizen's Climate Lobby members to present a program about their current topics.
- Promote sustainability and reducing carbon footprint by exploring incentives, purchasing practices, educational programs, etc.
- Explore doing another Clean Air Day at Birtcher site.

Environmental Justice - Partner with communities who bear the economic and health costs of economic degradation to create projects that mitigate those effects.

- We will support Planned Parenthood's work by advocating for funding, supporting the elections of candidates who support the Planned Parenthood organization, and provide education to the community on an important issue that affects women's reproductive rights and an opportunity to get involved at the local level.
- Support the efforts of Families Forward and South County Outreach with

Accomplishments	programming. With increased budget from the previous year, we were able to build our music library through the purchase of some new music.	
	We expanded our styles to include: rock, protest songs, film music, gospel songs, hymns, jazz, classical, musical theater, and music by UU composers. In August, we introduced a month-long "pop-up choir" event, where we only rehearsed music for that day. That was a popular activity,	

and helped with the uncertainty of planning ahead in a month with occasionally spotty attendance. On water communion Sunday in September, we performed the world premiere of "over the river in loud flood" by Southern California UU composer Rima Snyder. In the past year, we also changed our Children's Recessional songs to include the new pieces, "As You Leave This Friendly Place," and "This Little Light of Mine," in both English and Spanish. Prior to our move to St. George's, Dave Kinnear and Connie Pursell were doing excellent work on in-service slides to further support the music programming. By the end of the fiscal year, the choir will have had a total of nine mini retreats (including the ones scheduled for Sunday, May 20, and Sunday, June 10). We have had some lively discussions at these retreats, and continue to work hard on our new music. We also adopted the new choir covenant, after a group discussion about our common core values, led by Keith Tuominen and Wendy Washington. 20118-19 In the coming year, I would like to foster a more cooperative and efficient rehearsal process with the choir. We need to approach our increasingly Goals stylistically varied repertoire with mutual trust—the choir members need to trust me to listen and problem-solve challenging sections in rehearsal, and I need to trust them to be present and punctual, with an attitude of willingness to work through those challenges. I would like to continue to program the choir to sing more unique pieces, because I think they are extraordinarily capable, especially for their size group. I have been invited to lead a workshop in August at this year's UUMN conference in Portland, Oregon. I will be speaking on choral directing from the keyboard, with an emphasis on repertoire and rehearsal techniques for small choirs. I have also been asked to play for at least one choral music reading session. Continued support in the area of professional development is a key component in being able to attend UU events.

I would also like to occasionally include other musicians in the service. In January, we had jazz saxophonist Ivan Romero-Bautista, and on May 27, we are scheduled to have classical singer Monique Mauries. These delightful young people have offered to visit our congregation as a favor to me, because of our extensive and ongoing collaborative work at East Los Angeles College, but in the future, it would be wonderful to be able to offer them some compensation for their work.

These included guest speakers Jonafer Kwon, who spoke on Liberation, Tom Owen-Towle, who spoke on Beauty, Rabbi Noah Farkas, who spoke on the Homeless, Kevin Jagoe, who spoke on the topic of Holy Community, and our intern minister, John Bloom-Ramirez, who led seven services on subjects that included Hope through Kindness, Love through Voluntary Association, God is Gold, Transformation and Undoing denial, Serving the Forgotten, and Wisdom. In addition, we organized four lay led services, Reflections on the New Orleans GA given by Celia Young, and three "This I Believe" services on Hospitality, Justice, and Transformation, with reflections by, among others, Nikki Rinderer, Peggy Thompson, Carrie Snipes, Susan Jagielko, Dave Salahi, and Paul Bonafonte. We continued to implement Kent's scheme to use a select group of Worship Associates who meet periodically to review techniques and procedures. This has worked well to assure competent well-prepared WA's. A decision was made to utilize the same group of associates while we were at St. Georges, to avoid more changes on top of the strange surroundings. It was believed this would last 3-4 months. Because of delays in the building purchase, the group has continued unchanged for longer than anticipated, and some associates are growing tired, but the	

	system has worked well so far. We may need to add new WA's soon, especially if we incur additional delays. The attempt to implement live streaming of services to Laguna Beach took effort on the part of the committee and got underway with some success, but there were serious technical challenges and the effort was dropped after only a few services. The effort was not well received by many UUFLB members and will not be attempted again, even after we move to Birtcher. We were involved in the discussion about which temporary venue to select and eventually voted with others for St. George's. We have worked to make the transition to St. George's as smooth as possible. This involved developing a procedure for setup and breakdown and assigning weekly setup leadership responsibility to assure a sharing of responsibilities. Before leaving Madero, we made efforts that improved the sound. We have worked with the sound team to try to improve the sound quality at St. George's, but we are limited in what we can do there and it remains poor and full of echoes, and we're stuck with it for now. We hope for a timely move into our new building and will support efforts to implement an exceptional sound system at Birtcher.
2017-18 Goals	We will continue to schedule open pulpit services and work with Kent and our Worship Associates to improve services in the coming year. We have committed to seeking out speakers of diversity to support Race Matters efforts. We will work with our AV team to assure a smooth transition into our new home on Birtcher. One suggestion we plan to implement is to form a pool of excellent lay-led speakers chosen from Kent's proposed sermonwriting class coming up this July. This will involve more Tapestry members in services and cut costs as these speakers can take the place of guests.
Budgetary Needs	Outside speakers seem to draw larger crowds to open pulpit services, but add to our budgetary needs. We had asked for a \$3000 budget for the coming year, but because of budgetary constraints in a challenging year, we understand this will be cut to around \$1500. To meet this tighter budget, an effort will be made to utilize more Tapestry members in lay-led services and to invite guest speakers who may offer their services for free or at reduced cost.
