Director's Note: I'd like to think that in this time of introspection and sheltering in place, we are focusing less on goal-oriented accomplishments and more on building community and encouraging one another in spirit. Still, prior to taking a necessary break from in-person group singing in March, the choir has had much to celebrate this year, including the following...

- As always, we learned a wide variety of music, in many styles
- We incorporated the use of other instruments on several occasions (including violin, keyboard II, guitar, ukulele, and percussion)
- We participated in the Readers' Theater service, All Souls service, the intergenerational Christmas service, Christmas Eve, the Martin Luther King Choral Festival, and Celebration Sunday; we had also fully prepared a women's ensemble piece for Women's Rights Action Group Sunday, immediately prior to the shelter in place order
- Suzi Cassidy graciously organized and refurbished our music supply closet
- Since beginning Zoom services, we have made consistent improvements to our music sound quality
- Despite the many limitations of streaming the service content, we have done our best to bring as much variety as possible to the music programming
- New long-distance collaborations have been created with colleagues from other congregations
- We have seen new sides of the musicians within our congregation, and our musical volunteers have done an incredible job of stepping up when asked to develop their skills in new ways

INCLUSIVITY:

- The choir learned some inspiring new music composed by People of Color, additionally furthered by the director's attendance at the AUUMM conference in Denver, CO
- In the process of organizing our music supply closet, Suzi Cassidy unboxed our Braille hymnal sheets and moved them to a more accessible position in the filing cabinet
- The MLK Choral Festival at Neighborhood UU in Pasadena centered on themes of justice and freedom—the music selected for that event indicates devotion to those causes

FUTURE GOALS

- To navigate the unknown territory of returning to in-person music making as safely as possible

- To invest in a streaming license, so that we can expand our programming capabilities during our Zoom services
- To find ways for more musicians to participate in virtual group projects
- To maintain our Tapestry music community by having occasional Zoom meetings
- To continue singing diverse music from a wide variety of sources
- To foster a wider range of mutually beneficial collaborations with colleagues from other congregations

The UUA recently reconfigured the Welcoming Congregation program to encourage continuing LGBTQ+ support in congregations through annual re-certification (Tapestry achieved original certification in 2008). The committee was formed near the end of 2019 with the goal of achieving that status for 2019. We were successfully re-certified for 2019 based on our programming.

Programs that were supported and documented by the Committee included:

- Sermon ("Uganda is Calling," Nov. 2019) and film discussion with the Rev. Mark Kiyimba, minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Uganda and an activist for LGBTQ rights in Uganda.
- A six-part film and discussion series ("Transforming Hearts Collective: Trans Inclusion in Congregations") on understanding and welcoming persons with non-traditional gender identities.
- Minister's Seminar book discussion of "Unisex" by Jeffrey Eugenides, a novel about the intersex experience.
- Donations to the LGBT Center of Orange County and El Jardin de Las Mariposas, as part of our Generosity Sunday program.
- Recognition of LGBTQ+ days of observance through pulpit and newsletter announcements.

The committee will continue its work to achieve WC certification for 2020.

This Year's Accomplishments:

- Kick-off meeting on February 20,2020
 - 35 in attendance.
 - Goals of the program announced:
 - Recruit enough volunteers to be able to commit to serving dinner 1 night a month at the Alternative Sleeping Location (ASL)
 - Advocate for development of:
 - 125 new supportive housing units by 2025
 - 700 new supportive housing units by 2035
 - Participants signed up to:
 - serve meals at the ASL (enough to meet Goal #1)
 - make meal and care kits
 - run food drives
 - monitor South County cities regarding the development of affordable and supportive housing
 - advocate in the form of letter writing, attendance and speaking at city council meetings, for development of affordable and supportive housing
- Committee members visited supportive housing sites – one in Yorba Linda operated by National Core and one in San Diego called the Alpha Project.
- On April 1st, a training on how to speak at City Council meetings was held via Zoom for Tapestry volunteers. Kimberly Adams of YIMBY (Yes in My Back Yard) conducted the training and Rev Kent Doss discussed activism in the context of UU values.
- Bev Huff conducted a 4-part training of nearly a dozen volunteers on how to monitor the housing plans of South County cities. This group, called The Canaries, will monitor planning commission and city council agenda to determine when affordable and supportive housing developments are being considered. They will then alert the Welcoming Neighbors Home advocates.
- Karen Nichols led a virtual food drive raising \$2,069 for the Laguna Food Pantry.
- Ryan Lenny led a virtual kit-making drive which produced just over 150 care and meal kits which were donated to South County Outreach and CityNet.
- Dr. Stuart Perlman, a retired psychotherapist who is also an artist who has been doing portraits of homeless people in Venice Beach gave the sermon for Tapestry's April 26th service.
- A collaboration with United Way's United to End Homelessness is scheduled for June 2020 to host a virtual Advocacy 101 class.
- Dave Salahi created a Welcoming Neighbors Home webpage on Tapestry's website: <https://tapestryuu.org/welcoming-neighbors-home/>

Next Year's Goals:

- Tapestry volunteers will continue hosting 1 dinner per month at the Alternative Sleeping Location
- Conduct 1 to 2 food drives
- Hold 1 to 2 kit-making assembly parties
- Tapestry "Canaries" will continue to monitor South County cities on their progress toward developing more affordable and permanent supportive housing
- Continue training and development of our cadre of Tapestry housing advocates
- Turn out advocates as needed to city council meetings to advocate for affordable and supportive housing
- Advocate for the conversion motels into affordable and supportive housing units
